- What is community?
 - -People coming together and sharing similar interest
 - -Similarity, safety
 - -People come together to make something work like a team or family
 - -A support system
- What communities do you belong to?

- Where do you think the largest issues of providing equitable childcare for families in our area exist?
 - -Cost of Child Care
 - -Availability of care
 - -Home providers keep capacity low, so they won't have to credential
 - -Quality of care for Low-Income families
 - -Home providers cost more then Center-based providers
 - -Access to Health care
 - -Knox County data shows more married/no children homes
 - -Henderson County data shows more Senior Citizens
 - -Data could be skewed due to limited responses, responses based on bias- creates a shortfall of funding for our region
 - -Societal shift away from extended families

- What steps need to be taken to provide available, quality, and equitable child care in our community?
 - -Monitoring of staff by agencies/oversight
 - -Education and location
 - -Staffing challenges need to be addressed
 - -Raise Income limits to allow more access
 - -Lessen bureaucratic approval times
 - -Funding and policy assistance to providers from the State
 - -cases of providers not accepting funds due to strings attached
 - -Licensing for child care providers needs to be simplified
 - -creates difficulty attracting quality people into field
 - -Director's credentialing is more than Educators
 - -Accommodate providers with the right skills for working with children
 - -Credentialing does not equal caring- repair the disconnect
 - -Neighborhood based- closer access
 - -Create a "reference" system
 - -Transportation Systems for "out of the way" places
 - -Flexible Hours that reflect work schedules
 - -Re-educate society to allow families to prioritize their children over making money
- With the lack of pediatricians in this area, how do you access healthcare for your children?
 - -Availability is limited to 2 pediatricians in Galesburg in our Region
 - -Utilizing Family Doctors
 - -Utilizing Nurse Practitioners
 - -Traveling to Peoria (Out of Region)
 - -Providers are scheduling more than 3 months in the future
 - -Health Plans limit access to select Doctors
